STUDENTS GAIN

Andre M., 3rd gr., keeps improving in all subjects. At the end of 1st grade his math was poor. He could hardly write a sentence, his handwriting was illegible, and he was difficult to understand when he talked. He worked hard in the Tutoring Program in the 1st grade, the 2nd grade, and now in the 3rd grade. In 2nd grade, he moved farther away, but his grandmother <u>Toby</u>, still brought him to the Tutoring Program. Now by the 3rd grade Andre is doing much better in math and in writing, and his speech is clear. His mother knew about the Tutoring Program because all her friends in elementary school were in the program.

Michelle F., 4th gr., has gained significantly because of the Tutoring Program. As a 2nd grader she could hardly write a sentence. Since then she has been working hard in the Tutoring Program, and now as a 4th grader, she is writing fluently.

First Graders: Bianca F., 1st gr., Eliza A., 1st gr., and Ashley S., 1st gr., were all in the Saturday program last year as kindergartners, and they are all doing well in school as 1st graders.

<u>Emily P.</u>, 1st gr., is also doing well. Her mother, <u>Marisol P.</u>, was in the program as a high school student, and she realized how much it helped her. She wants her daughter to have the same benefits she had as a student.

Angel L., 1st gr., and <u>Jocelyn L.</u>, 2nd gr., are also doing exceptionally well. Their brother, <u>Everardo L.</u>, 11th gr., and sister, <u>Yulisa L.</u>, 10th gr., were in the Tutoring Program while they were in 2nd to 4th grades, and Jocelyn wanted to come to the Tutoring Program, too. Everardo attends North Side Prep H.S., and is a tutor with Inspired Youth to gain service learning credits for high school. Yulisa attends Lane Tech HS.

MONDAY EVENING TUTORING

Students work very hard every Monday evening at Bezazian Library. The group is mostly 5th-8th graders, plus three high school students, two 4th graders, a 1st grader, and a preschool student (taught by his mother). All the students study hard the whole time.

The students go to several schools: Goudy, McCutcheon, and Swift elementary schools, Senn HS, and Noble and UNO charter high schools.

The Monday evening tutors who work with these students are fantastic. They are dedicated, intelligent, and willing to work with any student on any subject. Monday evening tutoring is an important study time.

The first Monday in December students and tutors were divided into six groups for conflict resolution. The topic was using "I Messages," instead of automatically blaming the other person. All the groups worked well. Students and tutors work beautifully together.

FAMILY NIGHT, AN EVENING OF CONVERSATION AND PIZZA

Many parents came to the Monday Family Night at Bezazian Library on Columbus Day. The tutors sat with their tutees' families, and everyone had a good time. Around 10 parents, 10 tutors, 19 tutees, and 4 younger siblings came. Tutors and parents got to talk about how to help the children keep doing better in school this year, suggested by tutor Margaret Sullivan.

At the beginning of the evening, people were treated to pizza and soda, which they loved. The servers did a good job and included <u>Jeffrey V.</u>, 5th gr., <u>Itzel V.</u>, 6th gr, and <u>Nathan B.</u>, 9th gr., as well as tutor <u>Clay Cerny</u>, who was in charge. This year there was enough pizza!

While the tutors and parents were talking about goals for the students this year, the younger children played with the library's Legos, alphabet blocks, plastic bubble toys, and toy train cars and tracks.

WED./THURS. AFTERNOON TUTORING

Wed./Thurs. afternoon tutoring is very important for the 1st-4th graders who come to the Tutoring Program at the library after school. Their school homework is very hard for most of the children, and the tutors help them do it.

The afternoon tutors are very dedicated to helping the children. Some of them have been tutoring for many years, and they are patient with the kids. The children often don't want to do the homework of their hardest subjects, but the tutors help them with it. After completing their school homework, the tutors help the students with the work in the individual folders prepared by the tutoring director.

On Thursday afternoons, for the last portion of the tutoring time, several students from New Trier High School in Winnetka, IL, come to work with the children. The children love to work with the teenagers, and the high school students are excellent tutors.

FAMILY DAY, 1st-4th GRADERS

It was perfect day for a Family Day. Parents from 8 families came to talk with the tutors and get suggestions about helping their children with their school work. The parents got to know their children's tutors, and tutors got to know their tutees' families. Altogether 45 people were there: 18 students, 10 parents, 8 siblings, and 9 tutors.

Family Day came as the last part of Wednesday tutoring. It began as <u>Everardo</u> <u>L</u>, a tutoring grad and high school student at North Side College Prep, introduced the program in Spanish. A small section of the Inspired Youth Singers led the audience in two songs, with <u>Raul V</u>., 3rd gr., accompanying "This Land Is Your Land," on the keyboard. Then the families got to have special cookies and punch, served by tutoring grad <u>Armando S</u>., 11th gr., along with his and Raul's mother.

SATURDAY TUTORING IS AMAZING

Every other Saturday, 10am-12pm, over 40 children, 4yrs. old through 13 yrs. old, go to Margate Park Field House in Uptown Chicago to work with over 40 8th graders from Wilmette Jr. High. This is the 25th year of this program relating Wilmette Jr. High and the Tutoring Program.

The last couple of years in Saturday tutoring students have concentrated on writing. In the sessions this fall, the students have done two projects: writing about a picture from the book *Harris Burdick* and writing a scary short story on a prompt. The scary short story was done "round robin," where one team of tutor/student writes, and then passes it to another team. All the students are very creative.

28 TURKEYS GIVEN TO TUTORING FAMILIES AT SATURDAY PROGRAM

"Thank you, thank you, thank you," a father said as he was handed a turkey. He couldn't stop thanking the tutoring program for the gift the Saturday 8th grade tutors had given his family.

One mother was sick, but she brought her children in the rain to Saturday Tutoring at Margate Park to get a turkey.

A few families were asked beforehand if they wanted one a turkey. One woman kept wondering what she should say. "Yes. No. Yes. No." She had never cooked a turkey before, but she kept hearing about them and was curious about this tradition. He gave her (2 specific ideas from his long experience with turkeys.

There were many activities to choose from. The kids had a bean bag toss and a ring toss. They made necklaces, painted mini pumpkins, and decorated (and ate) cupcakes. The highlight of the day was the costume contest. The children went up by age groups onto a tiny stage in a big room in the basement of the church, and the children showed off their costumes. The children enjoyed being in front of people, and everyone enjoyed seeing them. Finally, everyone got a prize.

SORROWS

Gun violence has taken the lives of many tutoring students in the past several years. <u>V.'s father</u> was killed 7 years ago when V. was 2 months old, and the family still grieves. In the early '90's <u>J.'s 16-year old brother</u> was killed on the night of the 4th of July. <u>M. O'B</u>. was also killed one night. Others have died in their teens, 20's, or early 30's because of gun violence or other causes: <u>Donna, Kim, Antonio, Nikki, Shawn, Joseph, and Cecily's brother</u>. The Tutoring Program keeps working to have kids "make it" through their young years.

BAD NEWS

<u>Jessica</u>'s dad was laid off from his job as a hotel worker when the hotel workers were on strike in Chicago.

<u>Layla's</u> dad was taken to the hospital with chest pains because of a large blood clot. He was in the hospital for several days, and Layla and her sister missed several days of tutoring.

<u>Marilu's</u> mother was in the hospital for abdominal pains. Marilu missed several days of tutoring. Their mother will have an operation in a couple of months.

CROP WALK, October 2018

2 people said they wanted to go on the 36th annual Chicago CROP Walk. Then a 3rd decided to go. Finally, the group from Inspired Youth and Epworth Church, led by <u>John Sansone</u> of Epworth, ended up with *15 people!* Ten children ages 3 *(3!)* to 15, plus 5 adults walked a 2-mile route on the near South Side of Chicago, beginning at the historic 2nd Presbyterian Church on Cullerton and S. Michigan Ave. They walked to "Help CROP Stop Hunger." The group from Epworth UMC and IY walked fast. One mature walker could hardly keep up with the walkers age 3-6 yrs. old! And they all walked the whole 2 miles.

The day of the 2018 CROP was beautiful, sunny and not too hot, a good day for walking. When the walkers got back to the 2nd Presbyterian Church, they were

The singing and the accompanists were all outstanding.

EDGEWATER THANKSGIVING SERVICE AT CHICAGO ISLAMIC ISMAILI CENTER

Every 6-7 years the Chicago Ismaili Center, which is a member organization of ECRA (Edgewater Community Religious Association) gets the honor of hosting the annual interfaith Thanksgiving Service.

This year the program was held in the Social hall of Chicago Downtown JK. More than 475 people from different faith communities attended. Also present were: Honorable Congresswoman <u>Jan Schakowsky</u> and 48th Ward Alderman <u>Harry Osterman</u>.

Heads of several churches & other religious organizations labeled the event as one of the most well-attended & best organized Thanksgiving events that they had ever attended. Congresswoman Jan Schakowsky, in a written statement, said that she was most impressed particularly with the spirit of community service that she observed. She also expressed desire to participate in future programs of the Ismaili community.

The huge Ismaili Center was full for the Edgewater Thanksgiving Service. Before the concert, when the Inspired Youth Singers/ Epworth Church School Singers practiced, there were only a few people in the huge space. Suddenly the whole room was full. Every seat was taken. Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts sat on the floor in front and at the side.

For the program, the Inspired Youth Singers sang "It's Up to You and Me." They were great. Microphones high above the children carried the sound to the back of the hall, and the children sang out—even in front of 475 people! The children also behaved well during the remarks of the several speakers.

The Inspired Youth, and especially choir director <u>Philinda Carter</u>, were excited to see Congresswoman <u>Jan Schakowski</u>. Congresswoman Schakowski read Lincoln's proclamation of 1863, which established the 4th Thursday in November as a day for giving thanks. Afterwards Philinda was overjoyed that she got to shake Jan Schakowski's hand. Philinda told the congresswoman she was going to vote for her in the next election.

SINGING AT FRIEDMAN PLACE, HOME OF THE BLIND, November 2018 11 children and 3 adults sang at Friedman Place, Home of the Blind, in a beautiful concert the day before Thanksgiving. Four other adults also came as chaperones.

Five children accompanied the choir on the piano, Michelle F., 4th gr., Raul V., 3rd gr., Donovan F., 2nd gr., Eduardo F., 7th gr., and Gregorio F., 7th gr. The child accompanists were starting to get comfortable performing. If they made a mistake, they kept playing -- because the singers kept singing! And the children sang out. They were wonderful.

Around 25 residents, sight impaired, and 3 staff members listened. As an audience they were relaxed and congenial. If they wanted to know something they asked questions— how many children there were, what part of the city they came from. A different child announced each piece, telling their name, age, and the title of the next piece. Since the audience couldn't see, we wanted them to hear the sound of individual children's speaking voices so they could know more about the singers.

The audience loved the program. Many sang along on familiar songs and clapped along on some of them. At the end of the program a few children shook hands with the residents and told them their name. One woman in the front kept hugging 6-year old <u>Bianca</u> and wouldn't let her go. This was how important the children singing for them was.

SINGING AT "WINTER WALK ON WILSON," November 30, 2018

Santa was part of the "Winter Walk on Wilson," held on a Friday evening before Christmas in the re-converted space of the original Wilson el-stop. The space was huge. The Wilson el-stop had once been the plush end of the line of the red-line CTA train, and the reconverted space was enormous.

For the Winter Walk on Wilson, vendors set up tables for people to buy things. Around 150 smiling people mingled around.

When the Inspired Youth Singers performed, everyone gathered around in a loose semi-circle near the few chairs in front of the singers. The 15 Inspired Youth Singers sang 3 songs, with <u>Gregorio F.</u>, 7th gr., accompanying "Il Est Ne." The children looked festive, with girls in red-plaid vests and boys in white shirts. After Inspired Youth, two other groups performed, including Barrell of Monkeys. It was a gala event.

PRESENTS FOR 51 CHILDREN

In December, members of Glenview United Methodist Church gave Christmas presents to 50 children in Inspired Youth's afternoon tutoring program, including the children's younger siblings. The children had been looking forward to this for weeks, and they were so happy to get the presents!

Here's how it happened. In early October (!) parents gave gift suggestions to <u>Sue Ready</u> of Glenview UMC. Sue Ready organized Inspired Youth suggestions along with 3 other organizations.

On a Sunday in early November, <u>Zak Yasin</u>, a tutor with Inspired Youth, went to Glenview UMC to represent Inspired Youth. He had pictures of each child, along with a suggestion of what they needed. Members of the congregation chose one or two children to buy presents for.
