SUMMER PIANO PROGRAM

The 18th year of Inspired Youth's Summer Piano Program was full! 70 students came to Room 204 in the Edgewater Presbyterian Church two times a week for an hour each day to play on the ten keyboards in Room 204. Some of the families had keyboards at home to practice on. 17 families borrowed keyboards from Inspired Youth for the summer. Most of the keyboards were donated by kind people or purchased cheaply from thrift shores by former piano tutor <u>Jamey McDunn</u>. A few other keyboards were purchased directly by Inspired Youth during the past 20 years.

The parents were involved, too. For many of the young students, a parent sat with the child at the keyboard during the Piano Program session and guided their learning with the help of Alfred's Basic Piano Library. The parents loved to learn!

The families were from many places: Mexico, Puerto Rico, Bolivia, India, Burma, Mongolia, Ethiopia, and the United States.

CHILDREN LOVED THE PIANO PROGRAM A Report from the First Three Weeks

Bhagyaansh G., Pre-K, beamed when he heard the sound of the keyboard. Ashley S., 1st gr, really concentrated and was absorbed in learning to play the pieces. Bhaumik C., 2nd gr., finished Book A in 2 weeks and started Book B. He was so excited to play the piano that he learned to play "Happy Birthday" by ear. He also learned "Mary Had a Little Lamb" by ear.

Estefania O., 6th gr., was reluctant to try the piano, but when she played a few notes and heard the pretty sound, she was all smiles. She told her cousin about the Piano Program, and her cousin started right away. Selam D., 4th gr., practiced by herself and kept learning. Natalia N., 6th gr. and Sophia N., 3rd gr., also practiced by themselves. Natalie was reading the notes and taught her younger cousin Andrea N., 1st gr., at home. Baron F., kind., gained a lot since last year. He was also in the violin program.

Alan H., 10th gr., Emmanuel O., 8th gr., and Alexis H., 5th gr., all concentrated, and all learned fast. Emmanuel taught his younger brother, Gabriel O., 4th gr., who loved playing the keyboard. Danitzy R., 7th gr., Eduardo F., and Michelle F., 4th gr., all practiced by themselves and kept learning. Fazila V., 3rd gr., Alessandra P., 6th gr., and Mariana T., 7th gr., were just beginning and learned fast. Evelyn Z., 4th gr., wanted to play a "solo" for the recital, and not a duet!

Alex G., 16 yrs. old, but mentally disabled, was just starting to play the piano. He loved it. His mother labeled all the keys: A, B, C, D, E, F, G, and Alex was given an easy recital piece. He learned it in one day! He needed a harder piece!

Chikki K., 3rd gr., came the first day and was lent a keyboard to take home to practice on. She didn't come the rest of the week or the next, so Beth Palmer visited her family. Chikki came the 3rd

week, and she had learned a lot, just from one day at the program. She had been practicing at home!

All this was possible because of the wonderful Volunteer Piano Tutors who came to help the students learn. 17 people, besides the director, volunteered their time to help the students learn to play the piano. Five of the 17 Volunteer Piano Tutors learned to play the piano in the Summer Piano Program in previous years! One was a tutoring grad. All were excellent as piano tutors.

THE TWO RECITALS

58 students played in the two piano recitals on Aug. 6 and 8, 2019. Students came to the Piano Program twice a week for 6½ weeks and ranged in age from 4 to 16 years. For many, it was their first time playing the piano. Some had come to the piano program for several years. A student now in high school, Brandon W., had been part of the Piano Program for around 14 years! He was first part of the Summer Piano Program when he was three years old!

In the recitals, several students played pieces from the lesson book. Many students played well-known pieces using arrangements from books by Faber and Faber.

Five students who had just finished kindergarten were amazing. <u>Baron F.</u>, kind., played "I've Got Peace like a River." <u>Girivar M.</u>, kind., played "The Greatest Love of All." <u>Henry G.</u>, kind., played "Bye, Bye, Blackbird." <u>Arun S.</u>, kind., played "The William Tell Overture." <u>Rachel F.</u>, kind., played "God Is So Good."

The students loved their pieces. Sinai R., 1st gr., played "Let It Go." Ashley S., 1st gr., played "Down in the Valley." Jacob D., 1st gr., and Gabriel O., 4th gr., played "Star Wars," on two different nights. Donovan F., 2nd gr., played "It's Me., O Lord." Bhaumik C., 2nd gr., played "Theme from the 'Surprise Symphony." Akshay V., 3rd gr., played "Lean on Me." Zahira H., 3rd gr., played "Oh! What a Beautiful Morning."

Evelyn Z., 4th gr., played "Part of Your World." She wanted to play a "solo" (without a duet part) on the grand piano, and she did! It was stunning. Eden D., 3rd gr., played "The Rainbow Connection." Her sister, Selam D., 4th gr., played "Beauty and the Beast." Monish A., 5th gr., played "Do-Re-Mi." Jeffrey V., 5th gr., played "The Hokey Pokey!" Alexis H., 5th gr., played "The Entertainer." Sarahi R., 5th gr., played "Blue Moon." Maria M., 6th gr., played Beethoven's "Ode to Joy." Alessandra P., 6th gr., played "Finale," by Brahms. Yair S., 6th gr., played

"Looney Tunes." <u>Feven M.</u>, 6th gr., played "It Don't Mean a Thing." She chose that piece because her school choir sang it. All these students loved their pieces.

Mariana T., 7th gr., and Jeraldine O., 6th gr., played "When the Saints Go Marching In," in two different recitals. Fidel V., 7th gr., played "The William Tell Overture." Eduardo F., 7th gr., played "It's You I Like," by "Mr. Rogers." (Fred Rogers was a very accomplished pianist and composer.) Gregorio F., 7th gr., played "Soon and Very Soon." Emmanuel O., 8th gr., played "American Patrol." Leonela C., 8th gr., played "A Whole New World." Danitzy R., 8th gr., played "Tomorrow." Valerie B., 8th gr., played "La Bamba." Katie S., 8th gr., played "Für Elise," by Beethoven. Her sister, Hellen S., 9th gr., played "Minuet in G.," by Bach. Jovanny S., 10th gr., played "You Are the Sunshine of My Life." Alan H., 10th gr., played "Ain't No Use," by Bob Dylan. Alex G., 11th gr., played "This Land Is Your Land." Brandon W., 11th gr., played "A Short Story."

At the recitals, four piano tutors accompanied the students for the pieces which had "duet parts." <u>Seth Kaplan</u>, <u>Quinn Furness</u>, <u>Katie S.</u>, and <u>Beth Palmer played the duet parts</u>. They were skilled and patient!

The mothers_of several of the younger students helped their children practice at home and worked with them at the Piano Program. These mothers were essential to the Piano Program. Some mothers began to learn to play the piano, too!

The Audience

During the recitals, the audience was wonderful. People listened and enjoyed the music. They even clapped long enough for the students to get up and take a bow after playing their pieces. Many of the girls wore fancy dresses, and many of the boys wore

new shirts. They looked beautiful. The recital was special for everyone.

TUTORING GRAD IS BUSINESS OWNER

Christel Frausto was in the Tutoring Program in the early 1990's. On July 4, 2019, she called Beth Palmer to thank her for everything the Tutoring Program, children's choir, and Girl Scouts did for her. Here is part of her phone call:

"I had a lot of trouble in high school. I dropped out. Things happened. I didn't let that stop me. I graduated from high school, went to college, and I kept going and worked at corporate jobs for 13 years. But then I left that to start my own business and I'm really thankful.

"We have three businesses now. I'm so thankful. We moved to Peoria because there are more opportunities, and we can afford to grow our business, and Chicago is more expensive. We have an insurance agency and a gas station here in Peoria. I've actually taken on the role of helping start an Hispanic Chamber, and now tutoring girls, and I'm going to start working for the city on commission.

"There are just different things that I never imagined I'd be involved with. I've been applying for grants, and I'm thinking of all the opportunities these kids have. I want to make sure my business stays in an area that needs it. I don't want to move my business to an area that already has opportunities. I want to stay where people and the community need help.

"I live in Peoria, three hours away from Chicago. My business is in a tough area. All our businesses have always been in a tough area. I kind of love that. Why would I want to move? I applied for a grant last week, so I was pouring over the business plan, and I was thinking things through, and I realized, I don't want to leave. I want to stay right here and help people in the community and get things done, and

the oddest thing is it led me back to thinking about you and the Tutoring Program!

"I don't know if people message you or call you or email you, but you really helped me.

"I'm so emotional because on Saturday last week the Peoria local baseball team invited us to come sit in the skybox. ... The kids were so proud. [I want them to have opportunities, like] all the opportunities I had as a kid."

TUTORING GRAD IS A CASE WORKER

Shana Tims was in the Tutoring Program and children's choir in the early 1990's, along with her sister and cousins. Shana visited Chicago at the end of July. This is what she said:

"I am a case worker in Milwaukee. I work with children who have been neglected, socially abused, and physically abused, also in life and service injury.

"I have two degrees, in social services and applied science, and also one in real estate. I have three kids now, and I just bought a house in Milwaukee. A lot of good things have been happening.

"When we came to Chicago for the weekend, I was taking the kids to see my old school, my old church, my old house. And Beth is still here. I'm so happy to see her, so happy."
